Pause for the Pledge Day

U.S. Flag Day is on June 14th and Pause for the Pledge Day is also associated with Flag Day. “It honors the date, in 1777, on which the Continental Congress adopted the Stars and Stripes as the country’s official flag.”

The first official U.S. Flag Day was held in 1877, but it was officially recognized as a Federal holiday in 1949. The Pause for the Pledge Day began in Baltimore, Maryland in 1980 at the Star Spangled Banner Flag House and Museum.

It was the brilliant idea of Baltimore businessman Louis V. Koerber who encouraged his business acquaintances to join him on Flag Day to Pledge the Allegiance, creating the Pause for the Pledge Day. It was a small event, but it caught the attention of The National Flag Day Foundation. Louis Koerber just happened to be the President of this foundation, so it wasn’t long before the idea expanded to other communities and it quickly grew to the national level.



While it is held in the East at 7:00 p.m. EDT, the time for different zones include:

- ☆ 6 p.m. Central
- ☆ 5 p.m. Mountain
- ☆ 4 p.m. Pacific



If you are flying the Stars and Stripes at your house gather around, or you can attend the many ceremonies held in your community such as at the American Legion. Recite the following prayer for our Nation:

“O God, we thank Thee for the flag of our country and for all that our flag represents.

We thank Thee for giving victory to brave and valiant men who have given their last measure of strength in order that it might wave over the land of the free and the home of the brave.

We thank Thee for giving us the ideals of faith, and liberty, for preserving the sanctity of our homes, and freedom of worship. Conscious of our limitations and our deep unworthiness we pray that our Flag may bind together the many elements in our own dear country, and foster in our ranks a one hundred percent Americanism.

Make us who have served our country in time of war, willing at all times to uphold and defend our Constitution and our government. Grant that this Union, of sovereign states, may remain forever an indissoluble Union flying the same flag. Amen”

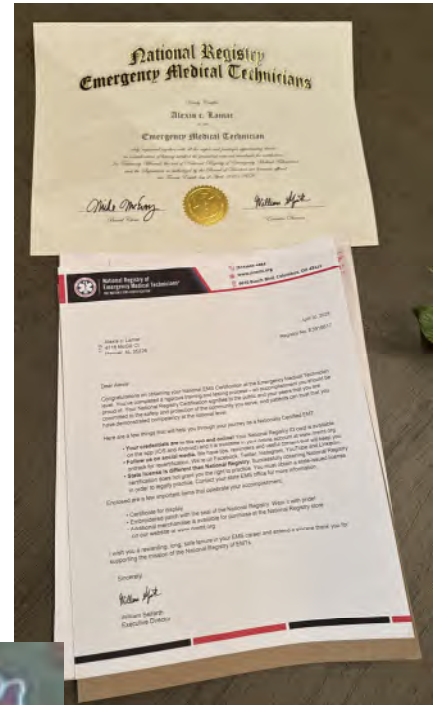

The Gauntlet to Re-adjustment in Civilian Life by a Veteran

Civilians generally are not cognizant of the unique challenges, upon separation our veterans experience; from military service to that of returning to their civilian life may cause stress as it concerns a veteran. Let's take a look.

As a veteran: these are our thoughts and engrained feelings:

- Relating to people who do not know or understand what military personnel have gone through in their experiences (*as many civilians **don't know** what they don't know and especially - feel!*).
- Rekindling the family relationship: bonding, trust and emotional well-being being rebuilt.
- Community/Familial Transition.
 - When moving to a new base or post, the military helps military personnel and families adjust. *This structure is often not automatically in place when someone separates from the military.* The Veteran and their family may have to find new ways to cope or create a communal support group to give a hand while transitioning home.
- Reconnecting with family and re-establishing a role in the family.
 - Families may have created *new routines* and/or activities during a veteran's absence (s) where both the family and the Veteran will have to adjust to these variations/changes.

Veterans transitioning back into their homelife (civilian life, we say) **may** face various changes or challenges to what they recall life was like before leaving on duty. It may be perceived the home modifications in life style, family and schooling may find adapting a little more tedious than one thought prior to discharge.

Get involved in this transitioning of our veterans for all they have done for us – and our nation.

The VA has programs that provide support and care (VR&E, VA Caregiver Support, Veteran-Directed Care, Homemaker and Home Health Aide Care – to name a few). Additionally, veterans may need basic necessities (food, clothing, housing, and therapy). Moreso, the need for social reconnection is essential to every transition. Build upon the emotional needs of a veteran to create or get involved with a new or old social network within your community or faith affiliation that assists in adjusting to a new way of life and modifies more of civilian life as it has changed contemporarily.



In that, veterans can be aided by services as that of Veterans at Home that provides no-cost preventative home modifications and repairs for veterans and their families to improve the safety and accessibility that increases a sense of independence, control and to facilitate a smoother “aging-in-place” transitioning.

In this light, life does have its challenges. Please know that you do not have to deal nor solve them alone. It is true whether it is just an everyday issue or something more complicated. The American Legion proactively guides you in seeking out support systems or resources to give you a hand up.

Do not wait... reach out... ask us. Asking does not cost a penny. Hint: a penny saved is a penny earned!

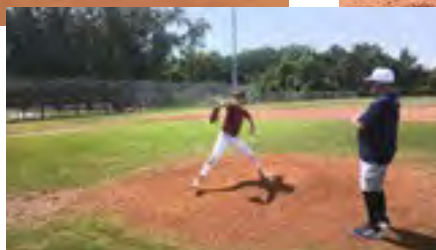
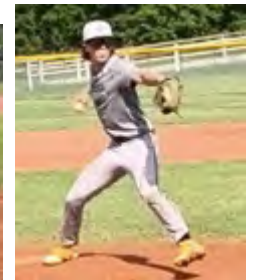

For clarity for memory recall "**CHECK POINT CHARLIE**" served as the crossing point between *WEST AND EAST*. Imagine those days of tension and propriety domains contested. Berlin was to be equitably divided though it was a "*testy*" division between the dominant forces who won World War II.

"**CHECK POINT CHARLIE**" has been a well-recognized gateway symbolically speaking, though with tensions galore between the eastern and western political philosophies. Even in review, looking back in time, **CHECK POINT CHARLIE** became a useless gateway when the USA shut down its metal booth – dismantled. This booth was relocated to Alliierten Museum in Berlin-Zehlendorf.

How many recall this division of Berlin? Do any of you recall the American tanks cruising the area of American troops? Now, remember this "*check point*" was the gate between American and Soviet sectors in the time frame of around February 1961.

The only thing left today is a double row of cobblestones that signifies where the Berlin Wall once stood is now representative of the *separation of powers*. It is far more than symbolic today as tensions mount once again. There was a time that President Bill Clinton visited this checkpoint as professed – "*You stood your ground; you kept watch; you fortified an island of hope... We thank our sons and daughters in uniform for a job well done.*"

The *Berlin Brigade* formation disbanded, deactivating its force on August 16, 1994 (nearly thirty years ago), with its command closing shortly after on October 1st. In recognition of their meritorious service due to their collective challenges during its missions of keeping the peacetime activities, was noted with the highest accolades.

This division or checkpoint was probably the best known and recognized crossing between conflicting political powers of governance; becoming symbolic of the division of powers of democratic republics and contrarian powers under the USSR First Secretary Khrushchev that abstained from conjoining the powers of a republican form of power.

It was ages later, that President Reagan said, "*Mr. Khrushchev, tear down this wall!*"! Eventually, the western powers prevailed. As the wall was begun on August 13, 1961, the division stunned the inhabitants as barbed wire was strung and barricades carved the city in half, tearing families apart to a point that many escaped from the West to the East against threats from the Eastern bloc.

In the year of the construction of the "*Wall*", more than 20 people died trying to escape by climbing over the barricade to freedom. Making matters more than difficult, the **CHECK POINT CHARLIE** standoff between the powers of the United States and the Soviet Union occurred on October 27, 1961. This standoff was also known as the *Friedrichstrasse Crossing Point*. This conflict was incurred by extreme tensions between the two countries over "*free access*" to Berlin in its entirety. Harassment occurred. The Soviets harassed the US forces traversing through East Germany. The American forces (U.S. Army) moved mobility tanks to **CHECK POINT CHARLIE**.

The standoff ended peacefully, however, as the Soviets agreed to withdraw their tanks and forces on October 28th after the US formed a pact with the Soviets. The agreement was formed through secret negotiations between our US Attorney General, Robert F. Kennedy, and the Soviet intelligence service officer, Georgi Bolshakov.

This "**HOT**" contention was "*cooled*" as it appeared that the Cold War would become a war in and of itself. Our American troops stood firm and entrenched in keeping our world safe from further intrusion, discord or threat. "*Thank You*" to our veterans for their stand for our freedoms, with right of freedom held firm.

I am proud to be an American; and ***prouder still*** in being a **Veteran** as we protect our rights and privileges founded, constituted and defended. Thank you, ***ALL OUR STANDING FORCES and VETERANS*** as our bastion of our freedom is saluted by all America! We are proud of our military and forces at large. "***Mission Accomplished!***"

American Legion Baseball

I love baseball!!! And no one does it better than the American Legion!

Do you know any of the history of baseball at the American Legion? It was in Milbank, South Dakota that the first American Legion baseball team played their first game. The American Legion Department of South Dakota began the program in 1925. Their purpose was to provide young men "an opportunity to develop their skills, personal fitness, leadership qualities, and to have more fun." And fun they did!

The first game was between Yonkers, New York, Post 321 who beat the team from Pocatello, Idaho. The inaugural game was held in Philadelphia in 1926. But all was not great for baseball's survival in the American Legion. Due to travel costs amongst others, the season in 1927 was cancelled. Oh dear, but we need not fret because we know that American Legion baseball is alive and well in 2025, one hundred years later.

Who came to the rescue? "Commissioner Kenesaw Mountain Landis who pledged a \$50,000 annual donation from Major League Baseball." American Legion baseball started up again in 1928 and by 1929, teams from every state in the Union participated, including the District of Columbia.

I was not aware, but "MLB has continued to support American Legion Baseball annually, although there is no formal partnership between the organizations." To date, more than 3,500 teams participate in American Legion Baseball.
